#### Overview

This course will introduce students to the field of medical anthropology through examination of health and illness from a cross-cultural perspective. We begin by exploring ideas about well-being and the body in societies of varying complexity, and subsequently examine conceptions of biological normalcy and medical illness from a variety of perspectives, including biocultural anthropology; critical medical anthropology; feminism; post-colonial studies; globalization; and political ecology. Topics discussed will include fundamentals of nutrition; growth and development; medicalization of women's reproductive health; theories of aging; mental health and illness; medical pluralism; impact of globalization on health, social inequality and infectious disease; and health of indigenous peoples in Canada.

Through course readings and assignments, you will become familiar with the requirements for presentation of evidence and argumentation in the social sciences. You will be encouraged, not only to think independently, but also to work in small problem-solving groups to address specific issues raised through the assigned readings and our discussions in class.

- 2. Include a brief summary of the type of information you were able to access through each resource (100 words); and outline why you think it is reliable and authoritative (100 words);

Research Wiki 25% of course grade

This assignment calls on you to collaborate with three or four other students in creating electronic encyclopedia type entries (or wikis) examining diseases or illnesses threatening the well-being and/or potential survival of a marginalized human group within in the developing world. Choose the wiki topic you would like to work on from the list of eight leading causes of death in low income countries as determined by the World Health Organization. This list includes: Lower respiratory infections, HIV/AIDS, Diarrhoeal diseases, Malaria, Preterm birth complications, Tuberculosis, COPD, and Diabetes mellitus.

You will be able to sign up for wiki topics of Monday, February 1. There will be an in-class workshop on the creation of wikis using Moodle on Monday, February 22. The wiki creation process will be monitored on an ongoing basis. Grades will be assigned for both group activities and individual wiki contributions. In-class presentations and discussions of wikis will be on Wednesday, March 30 and Monday, April 4.

### Your Wiki should:

- 1. Engage the reader and clearly identify your subject;
- 2. Outline current and potential impacts of the disease or illness on the societies or cultures in the developing world;
- 3. Summarize any debate(s) that may exist concerning whether this disease or illness is experienced differently by peoples of different ages, ethnicities, nationalities, genders, or economic and/or social status;
- 4. Identify any potential changes in human behaviour or possible healthcare or economic initiatives that could be undertaken by individuals, communities, law makers, government organizations, NGOs, corporations, biomedical practitioners and/or traditional healers to prevent the spread or alleviate the suffering from this disease or illness;
- 5. Outline any benefits and/or risks to the health and well-being of individuals or the larger community that could result from your recommended changes in behaviour or adoption and implementation of these initiatives;
- 6. Be well organized and provide proper citations from at least 15 reputable and reliable sources of information using the embedded citation formats of *The Chicago Manual of Style*.
